## Fr Sean Davidson

We extend a **warm welcome** to Fr Sean Davidson as our new parish priest this coming Thursday, 1<sup>st</sup> September. He will begin his priestly ministry amongst us with Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament at 11.30 and Mass at 12 noon.

Fr. Sean was born in London in 1979 and spent much of his youth in Ireland. He gave his life to Christ in the year 2000 and during the subsequent three or four years began to feel called to the sacred priesthood. Regularly frequenting the holy shrine of Our Lady of Knock, meditating on Sacred Scripture, and attending his local perpetual Eucharistic Adoration chapel were central to the discovery of his vocation. In 2009, he was involved in the foundation of an association in France called the Missionaries of the Most Holy Eucharist, devoted to preaching on the Real Presence of Christ in the Blessed Sacrament. This afforded him the possibility of travelling as a Eucharistic missionary throughout Europe, America, and as far as Asia. After being ordained to the sacred priesthood in France on June 26th 2011, the solemnity of Corpus Christi, he celebrated his first Mass on the memorial of Our Lady of Perpetual Help. He began his priestly ministry in the parish of Sanary-sur-mer and then worked in the ancient shrine and basilica of Saint Mary Magdalene in south-east France. The organisation of Eucharistic Congresses, parish missions, as well as spreading Eucharistic love through the different means of communication formed part of his mission during this period. In December 2014, Fr Sean was given responsibility for the establishment and direction of a Eucharistic retreat centre in the Seminary of the Immaculate Conception, Long Island, New York. His ministry there consisted mainly in providing various forms of retreats, including the Ignatian spiritual exercises, as well as offering spiritual direction. He was privileged to be able to lead ordination retreats for seminarians and deacons studying in the north-east of the United States, as well as for members of different religious congregations. In 2018, Fr Sean returned to London to be with his father who was terminally ill. He went on to spend a year in the parish of Our Lady of Reparation in West Croydon. During this time, he was also able to work with Mother Teresa's Missionaries of Charity, supporting them in their beautiful work of love for Christ's poor. In February 2020, he moved to the Shrewsbury Diocese serving as parochial administrator of the parish of St Chad in Cheadle village and St Ann in Cheadle Hulme.

Luke 14:1,7-14 On a sabbath day Jesus had gone for a meal to the house of one of the leading Pharisees; and they watched him closely. He then told the guests a parable, because he had noticed how they picked the places of honour. He said this, 'When someone invites you to a wedding feast, do not take your seat in the place of honour. A more distinguished person than you may have been invited, and the person who invited you both may come and say, "Give up your place to this man." And then, to your embarrassment, you would have to go and take the lowest place. No; when you are a guest, make your way to the lowest place and sit there, so that, when your host comes, he may say, "My friend, move up higher." In that way, everyone with you at the table will see you honoured. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and the man who humbles himself will be exalted.' Then he said to his host, 'When you give a lunch or a dinner, do not ask your friends, brothers, relations or rich neighbours, for fear they repay your courtesy by inviting you in return. No; when you have a party, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind; that they cannot pay you back means that you are fortunate, because repayment will be made to you when the virtuous rise again.'

**Parish History Enquiry**. We have been contacted by a PhD student at Northumbria University who is carrying out research about photographs taken during the liberation of Belsen concentration camp in April 1945. The archive at the Manchester Jewish Museum has an envelope sent to the Rev'd Gannon at St Joseph's enclosing a report about Belsen and some photographs. The report was written by an army C of E padre, Rev'd Thomas Stretch. The envelope has had its stamp and postmark removed and there is no covering letter so the sender and date are unknown, but it is assumed it was sent to Rev'd Gannon by another padre who was stationed in Belsen. If the student could ascertain the dates when the Rev'd Gannon was at St Joseph's it would help to date the letter. Here at St Joseph's we had a Fr John Gannon

as an assistant priest from 1974 to 1981. Can anybody throw any light on the possibility of a Fr John Gannon being here or at Reddish during the 2<sup>nd</sup> World War?
